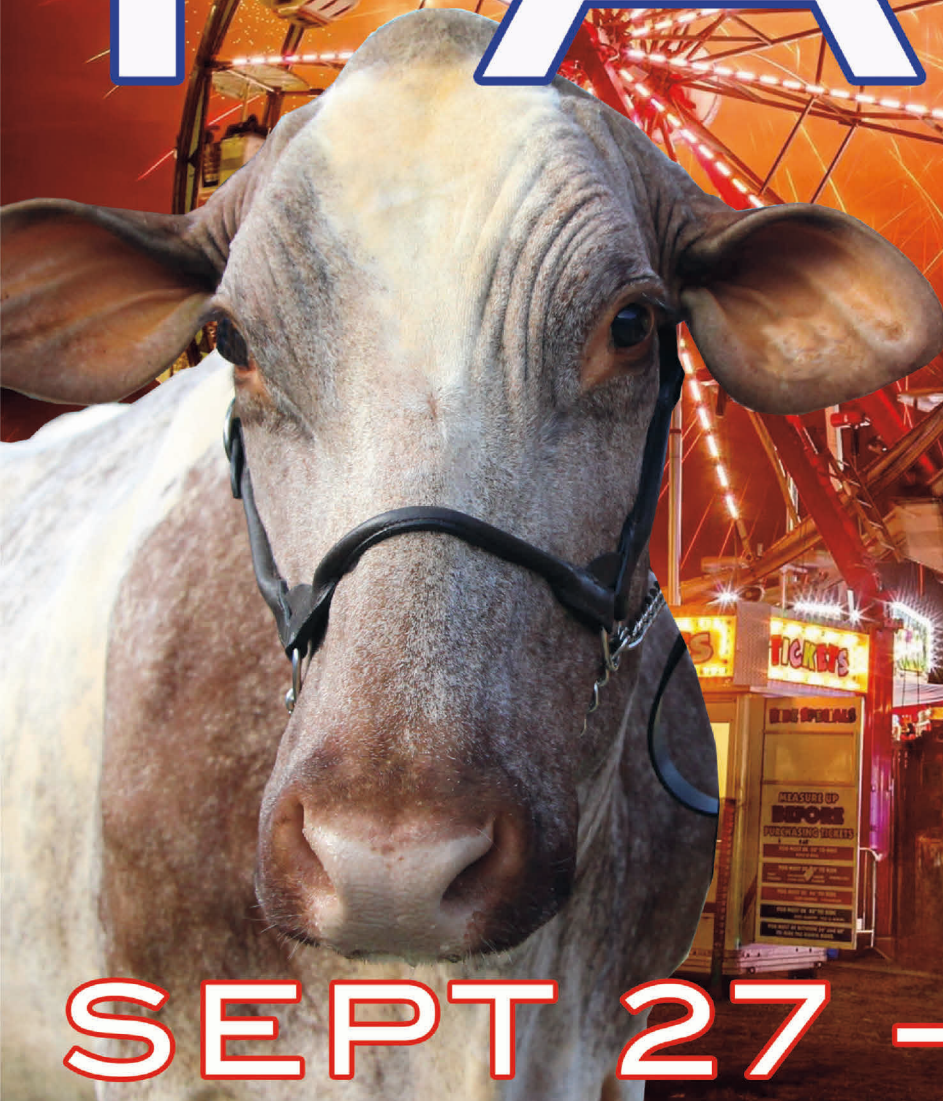

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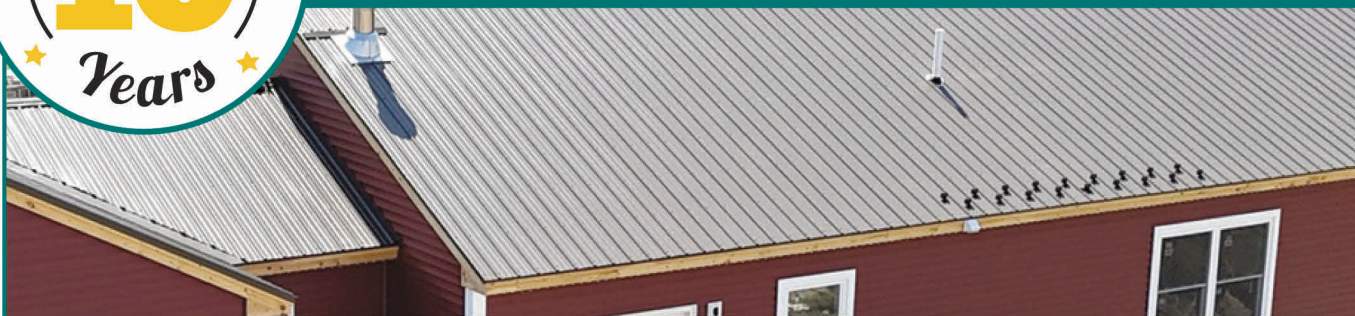

## Weigh-off

1. All judges' decisions are final. All judges will be responsible for having a complete knowledge of all rules and how to implement them fairly. It will be necessary to have a current copy of the rules present at each site in public view so anyone may reference them.
2. Growers are to aid and assist the site in running the weigh-off upholding the integrity of the weigh-off site.
3. The Cumberland Farmers Club representative and site coordinator are to be in charge of the gathering of registration, money, weights, measurements, and other information deemed necessary.
4. Site coordinators, growers, and the Cumberland Farmers Club representatives, and site representatives are to work as a team to ensure each site is as accommodating to the growers, site, and Cumberland Farmers Club as possible, upholding the values of fair competition.
5. The Cumberland Farmers Club Giant Pumpkin/Squash weigh-offs are open to anyone wishing to participate without prejudice. All growers must comply with all rules and regulations set forth at the weigh-off site they wish to participate in. Any rules the Cumberland Farmers Club wishes to have must be fair and impartial for all growers.
6. The above-mentioned representatives will also assume responsibility for ensuring the integrity of the fruits and that scales have been calibrated by a recognized weights and measurement business or government prior to the weigh-off.

## Fruits and Growers

1. The entry must be grown, cared for from seed to harvest, and exhibited by the grower. In case of an emergency the site coordinator, grower representative, and site representative will decide on the validity of the excuse.
2. Number of entries shall be limited to the following in the name of fairness: Giant Pumpkins – Adult: One entry per family. Giant Squash – Adult: One entry per family. Giant Pumpkins – Child (ages 8-15): One entry per child; limit 3 children per family. Giant Squash – Child (ages 8-15): One entry per child; limit 3 children per family. Jack-O-Lanterns – Adult: One entry per family. Jack-O-Lanterns – Child (under 15): One entry per child; limit 3 children per family.
3. Judges for a weigh-off will consist of the club/grower representative, site coordinator, and site representative, or 2 experienced growers. The two judges for the growers will be appointed by the Cumberland Farmers Club representatives. If any judge has an entry that is in question or cannot be present the day of the weigh-off, they will be excused from the judge's panel, and another grower will be appointed in their place.
4. All specimens must be weighed on a certified scale. A certified scale is one that has been inspected and certified by a Federal Governmental Agency and must have a current certification sticker attached to the scale. Scales that have been certified by a local government agency for commercial purposes are also acceptable scales.
5. No foreign material (i.e. fungicides, caulking, skin additives, etc.) will be permitted in the weighing of any fruit. Vines must be trimmed to within one inch of the stem of the fruit. The judges have the right to inspect any and all fruit before weights and measurements become official. Refusal of any inspection to any entry will cause the entry to be classified "exhibition" only.
6. The specimen must be sound, healthy, and undamaged. Entries must be free of rot, holes or cracks through to the cavity and serious soft spots.
  - A. If a soft spot is superficial and does not go through to the cavity of the fruit, it will be judged as an official entry.
  - B. The judges reserve the right to prove cracks, holes, and to dig out soft spots to judge a fruit official or not. Before the judges can execute any of the previous, they must have the grower present.
7. All entries, except field pumpkins (Jack-O-Lanterns), must arrive on a pallet for ease of handling by Cumberland Fair personnel.
8. Giant pumpkin/squash must weigh at least 100 pounds to enter.
9. All entries must stay on the fairgrounds for the entire duration of the Fair.
10. Fruit will be accepted at designated gate on Bruce Hill Road at Hall Road, the access to the Fair and Farm Museum, only from 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. on Sunday, September 27
11. Fruit will be weighed beginning at 9:30 a.m. Sunday, September 27.
12. Field pumpkins (Jack-O-Lanterns) may be moved inside the Exhibition Hall after weigh-off.

## Color Requirements and Prize Money

1. A. Squash will be classified as follows – 100% of the following colors or color combinations: green, blue and gray. The surface area of the fruit as grown in the garden, not including the portion that was in contact with, or close proximity to the ground. This area will include the area between the ribs, around the stem, and the blossom end. This will not include any netting (cantaloping) or any discoloration caused by the close proximity to, or the area on the ground.

B. Pumpkins will be all fruit not classified as squash.

2. In the event of a tie of two or more places, all entries that are tied will have the prize money for the places that are tied, added together then split equally amongst the places that are involved.

3. Winner will be the heaviest pumpkin or squash by weight.

4. All fruit entered shall be grown within the borders of the State of Maine to be eligible for premiums. The Cumberland Farmers Club and its officially sanctioned site shall not be held liable for compensation, loss, damage, or injury to any person, exhibit, or personal property. All premiums are not guaranteed. Money payouts will be contingent upon receipt of sponsorship amounts received.

**INGREDIENTS**

For the Cake

1/2 cup milk  
1 tbsp lemon zest  
2 tbsp fresh lemon juice  
2 cups & 1 tsp all-purpose flour  
1/4 tsp baking soda  
1/4 tsp salt  
1 cup blueberries  
1/2 cup unsalted butter, softened  
1 1/4 cups granulated sugar  
2 large eggs

For the Glaze

3/4 cups confectioners' sugar  
1/4 tsp lemon zest  
1 1/2 tbsp fresh lemon juice

**DIRECTIONS**

1. Preheat oven to 350°F.
2. Grease a 9x5 inch loaf pan.  
Line bottom of pan with parchment paper, then grease paper.

Cake:

3. In small bowl, whisk together milk, lemon zest, and lemon juice. Let sit for at least 10 minutes.
4. In medium bowl, whisk together 2 cups flour, baking soda, and salt.
5. In small bowl, toss blueberries with remaining teaspoon of flour. Set both bowls aside.
6. In separate bowl, cream the butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Scrape down the sides of the bowl, then beat in eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition.
7. Beat in a third of the flour mixture, then half of the milk mixture. Beat in another third of the flour mixture and remaining milk mixture, followed by remaining flour mixture.
8. Add flour-dusted blueberries to the batter and fold until evenly combined.
9. Transfer batter into prepared pan and smooth the top.
10. Bake for 50-60 minutes, until the cake is golden brown and a tester comes out clean. Let cake cool in pan for about 10 minutes, then on cooling rack until completely cooled.

Glaze:

11. In small bowl, mix together confectioners' sugar, lemon zest, and lemon juice. Add more confectioners' sugar or lemon juice as necessary to make a thick but pourable glaze.
12. Spoon glaze over top of the cake, letting it drip down the sides.
13. Let glaze set for 10-15 minutes before serving.

**DIRECTIONS**

1. Preheat oven to 350°F. and line an 8x8 inch baking pan with parchment paper, leaving a few inches overhang on two sides so you can easily lift the bars out when they are cooled.
2. To a medium bowl, add the oats, flour, sugar, melted butter, milk, vanilla, and salt. Stir well to combine into a uniform mixture. It will be thick and it should hold together easily when pressed between your fingers.
3. Set aside 1 cup of the batter to use as the topping
4. Add the remaining batter mixture to the bottom of the prepared pan, pressing evenly to cover completely.
5. Evenly spread the blueberry jam over the batter. Then, sprinkle on the blueberries and lemon zest. Press the berries down very lightly.
6. Crumble the remaining dough mixture over the top to cover evenly and press down slightly.
7. Bake for 35-40 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove pan from the oven and let cool on a wire rack until room temperature.
8. Use the parchment paper to lift the cooled bars out of the pan. Slice into bars carefully using a serrated knife.

6. Transfer the batter to the prepared pan and spread it evenly to the edges. Sprinkle the remaining 1 teaspoon sprinkles over the top of the batter.
7. Bake the small-batch blondies for 24 to 28 minutes, until the center is set, the top is brown, and a toothpick or thin knife inserted into the center comes out with a few moist crumbs. It's OK if the toothpick isn't clean, but you don't want to see any raw batter.
8. Remove the blondies from the oven and cool completely in the pan on a rack. Use the parchment to lift the blondies out of the pan and transfer them to a cutting board before slicing and serving.

1. Preheat oven to 375°F.
2. In a large bowl with electric mixer, beat the butter and sugar until well combined, about 2 minutes.



These demonstrations will consist of a single horse, pony or mini and/or pair of horses, ponies or minis demonstrating their ability to control their animals and drive them through a course.

The exhibitor can be one of two; 1.) A youth teamster who is 17 & under, 2.) A exhibitor/owner of a pair or single mini, no specific age group.

Exhibitor will collect one money per class.

#### 4-H EXHIBITION HALL ENTRIES

Eligibility: Open to all 4-H members in Cumberland County, without discrimination. 4-H Club members must have attended 80% of their club meetings unless excused by their leader. 4-H Project Records must be up to date.

Exhibit Rules: All members are expected to enter according to the exhibit requirements of respective projects taken. **ONE EXHIBIT PER PROJECT IS ALLOWED.**

Each entry must have a standard 4-H Exhibit and Judging Card securely attached to it. This card is available from the Extension Office. Both sections of the Exhibit and Judging Card must be filled out completely by the 4-H member unless they are unable to do so. (A leader or parent may help member complete cards if needed.) Include the unit level if the project has one but otherwise write the number of years the member has been in the project in the Unit Level space. Include your age as of January 1st, of the current year, in the Age space of the card. Failure to fill the card out completely may result in a one-ribbon markdown. Any special considerations that should be considered by the judges should be written on a post it note attached to the 4-H Exhibit and Judging card by the leader. The Cumberland Farmer's Club will afford the best protection possible for exhibits, but Extension and the Fair distinctly disclaim any liability for losses or damage to exhibits. Note: All posters will be appropriate size to display projects. Audio and visual playback equipment may be available at the exhibit hall for members' use during fair week. Call the UMaine Extension Cumberland office with any special needs or requests you may have regarding your project. For projects where a product is difficult to exhibit, members can display four (4) captioned photographs showing the member working on a project and a description of what the member did or learned in that project.

Exhibits should be brought to the 4-H Exhibit Hall on either of the following days based on the projects that youth have entered. If a club leader or member drops off projects on Thursday for judging on Friday, they may also drop off projects that will be judged Saturday at the same time:

Projects may be picked up from 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM the Sunday following the Fair.

Judging: The judging will be done on the "Danish System". Decisions of the judges are final.

Awards: A Rosette may be awarded in each project unit for exhibits that are outstanding in workmanship and quality. Rosettes will be awarded at the discretion of judges. 4-H Cloverbuds (age 5-8) may not participate in any competitive large animal shows. Cloverbuds are encouraged to enter exhibits in the 4-H exhibition hall. Cloverbuds will receive a participation ribbon and may receive a \$3.00 honorarium.

#### PROJECT CATEGORIES:

##### AGRICULTURE

Article or display pertaining to agriculture. Examples might include detailed farm layout, something pertaining to the industry of agriculture or horticulture, demonstration of agriculture literacy, etc.

##### ANIMALS

Separate entries may be submitted for each species of animal as long as each is carried as a separate project.

##### ANIMALS-LARGE

An item made by the member in the project with an explanation included by the member about the project or photos with captions, or a notebook, etc. This includes Beef, Dairy, Goats, Horse, Sheep, Swine, Working Steers, etc.

##### ANIMALS-SMALL

Same as large animals. No live animals. This includes Cats, Dogs, Gerbils, Hamsters, Guinea Pigs, Rabbits, etc.

##### AQUATIC LIFE

Article or display (poster, etc.) related to fish care, i.e., breeding, diseases, water quality, equipment, natural habitat, species, etc.

##### ART

A freehand painting in oil, watercolor, or acrylic, or drawing in charcoal, pencil or pastels, ready for hanging, properly matted, and/or framed, displaying appropriate skills for level and medium used.

##### CAKE DECORATING

Level I: Up to 2 years of experience) Smoothing techniques, and at least 2 different cake decorating techniques.

Level II: (3-5 years of experience) Smoothing plus a new technique for each year in the project.

Level III: (6 or more years of decorating experience) Smoothing plus a new technique for each year in decorating.

##### CANDIES AND CONFECTIONS

Plate of homemade candy displayed appropriately. No more than 1 lb. total. Include recipe. Include an explanation by the member about the project.

##### CAREER EXPLORATION

A display or report that showcases the member's broader understanding about future pathways. Examples include a report about a specific career and educational or vocational pathways to get there, a display depicting a job shadow or internship experience, a display about careers in a particular field, a display or written piece explaining one or more workforce development skills to the audience, etc.

##### CERAMICS/POTTERY

Article showing appropriate skills for age level and experience.

##### CHILDCARE

Article made for a child or display showing skills needed by childcare provider. Specify the age of child for which exhibit is made.

##### CITIZENSHIP

A display or report that highlights being an involved member of a community. Could include service learning, speaking and collaboration or other types of civic service.

##### CLOTHING/TEXTILES

No pattern instructions need be attached to article. All articles must be sewn by member, be developmentally appropriate for the age of the member and be appropriate for their number of years in the project.

Level I: Non-wearable item. Example: quilt, pillow, windsock, doll, stuffed animal, banner, etc.

Level II: Wearable accessory. Example: tie, apron, skirt, blouse, vest, tote bag, etc.

Level III: Clothing WITHOUT Fasteners. Example: pull-on T-shirt, pants, skirt, vest, jumper, dress, leggings – NO zipper, buttons, or other fasteners.

Level IV: Clothing WITH Fasteners. Example: skirt, shirt, blouse, jacket, vest, jumper, dress, pants, shorts, etc. With zipper and/or buttons or other fasteners.

Level V: Repurposed: either wearable or non-wearable, designed and sewn from previously used materials. The item must be at least 50% recycled material (reusing an existing item in a new way). The completed project is different from its original use.

### **COMMERCIAL CRAFTS**

If article made by member from a kit, must be age appropriate. Must be marked "made from kit."

### **COMMUNICATION ARTS**

An article or display that showcases a form of communication that is representative of 4-H project work throughout the year. Communication can take many forms including public speaking, demonstration, teaching, judging, performing arts, music, marketing, blogs, web design, graphics, and more.

### **COMPUTER SCIENCE**

Level I: Digital 2D Art- creation using software, tablet & stylus

Level II: 3-D Printed Object- Three-dimensional, physical object created from a digital design

Level III: Artificial Intelligence- Project or display related to Artificial Intelligence (AI). Should include an overview of what was learned about AI.

### **CRAFTS**

Handmade item pertaining to the project. Include an explanation by the member about the project. Explanation should be attached and include a list of materials and steps used to make the craft.

### **CREATIVE CRAFTS**

Handmade item pertaining to the project. Include an explanation by the member about the project. Explanation should be attached and include a list of materials and steps used to make the craft.

### **CREATIVE UNLIMITED**

Any exhibit made entirely by the 4-H member for a project in which they were enrolled that isn't covered under another project category in these rules. Label the exhibit card with "Creative Unlimited" and the name of the project (e.g., "Creative Unlimited - Composting"). More than one exhibit may be entered in this category as long as it is about a bona fide 4-H Project, and it is the member's only entry in that project. Leaders are asked to carefully check these exhibits to make sure they fit this category.

### **CREATIVE WRITING**

One original piece of work by member (example, poem, short story), up to 1,000 words.

### **EARTH SCIENCE**

Article or display related to project. Example: astronomy, meteorology, oceanography, etc.

### **ENGINEERING**

Article or display related to project. Examples might include a display on robotics, a trebuchet, a toothpick bridge, or a mechanical project demonstrating physics. Specify if made from a kit.

### **ENTOMOLOGY**

Include an explanation by the member about the project.

Option I: A display of what has been done in the project during the year. Examples: beekeeping, planting a pollinator garden and displaying photos of butterflies visiting the garden; a non-toxic way to eliminate pests; pictures of insects in their natural habitat. No scrapbooks or kits, and NO LIVE BUGS!

Option II: A display showing the stages of the life cycle of one insect.

Option III: Display a collection (Photos or drawings) neatly mounted and labeled, showing their effects on the environment.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS**

An article or display pertaining to project. Examples include but are not limited to composting, waste reduction, climate change, water or air quality, or an item made from recycled materials.

### **FLOWER GARDENING**

A collection of cut flowers grown by member. Include and attach a description by the member listing variety. Not to be judged on arrangement, but collection should be appropriately displayed or 4 photographs at various stages of garden.

### **FOOD AND NUTRITION**

No mixes or frozen dough allowed. This category allows for sweet or savory recipes with an American or international flare. All food entries must include the recipe.

Food will be judged on taste, texture, and appearance. Food should be submitted for display on a white paper plate in a new, clear plastic bag.

### **FOOD PREPARATION**

All food entries must include the recipe.

Option I: 2 cookies and a recipe.

Option II: 3 muffins and recipe.

Option III: 4 plain yeast rolls and recipe.

Option IV: Yeast bread, whole loaf, any size, and recipe.

Option V: Fancy breads, whole loaf, any size, and recipe.

Option VI: Pie, 1 or 2 crust, whole pie (in pie plate) and recipe.

OR

Recipe Collection: Create recipe booklet or box of at least 10 recipes used in the current 4-H project; include 5 photos reflecting different recipes either in progress or finished product with captions. Each recipe should include source (i.e., cookbook, Grandma, etc.) or could be varied. Only one collection per member and should be appropriate to skill level.

### **FOOD PRESERVATION**

The most recent USDA guidelines for canning must be followed, including processing, dated labels and containers. All food preservation entries must include the recipe and state the processing method and time.

Level I: 1 product. Any combination of fruit, vegetable, relish, or honey.

Level II: 2 uniform jars of different products. Any combination of fruit, vegetable, pickle, or relish.

Level III: 3 uniform jars of products. Must include 1 fruit, 1 vegetable, and 1 of the following: jam, jelly, marmalade, pickles, relish, preserves, or meat.

Level IV: Quantity of 3 dried items from one of the categories. Dried food may include herbs, fruit leathers, vegetable or jerkies wrapped in plastic.

### **FORESTRY**

An article or display that explains a forest product, a forestry best practice or method, a threat to the future of forestry (insects, animals, humans etc.) or a collection of bark, leaves or cones properly labeled.

### **GEOLOGY**

A collection of 10 or more different rocks and minerals properly labeled and displayed in a suitable container, with general location of the find noted OR project about geology (study of rocks and minerals)

### **GREAT BIG WORLD**

Item, display, or report pertaining to the geography, people or culture of another region of the world. Exhibits could showcase the region's geography, economy, agriculture, population, language, housing, music, crafts, clothing, holiday celebrations and more.

### **HEALTHY LIVING**

Healthy Living: An article or display pertaining to any area of healthy living. This could include but is not limited to sports & physical activity, nutrition, wellness & disease, personal development, mental & emotional wellbeing, substance abuse, food insecurity, and health equity.

### **HERITAGE CRAFTS**

A handmade item that showcases a skill or technique passed down from less modern times. Include a description card explaining the specific skills or process used. Items in this category may include but are not limited to baskets, candles (rolled, dipped etc.), calligraphy, leather crafting, needlepoint, metal work, print making, rugs and soaps. No items from kits are accepted.

### **HOBBIES AND COLLECTIONS**

Article of display; include a report noting what was learned in this project.

### **HOME IMPROVEMENT & DESIGN**

A homemade accessory for your home displaying appropriate skills for level exhibited. Include an explanation from the member about the project and how the item is used to enhance your home.

### **INDOOR GARDENING**

Plants grown by member. Include an explanation by the member about the project and varieties displayed.

Option I: Potted houseplant.

Option II: Dish Garden or terrarium

Option III: Actual examples of 3 different ways to propagate houseplants.

### **KNITTING AND CROCHETING**

Handmade article pertaining to project. Include an explanation from the member about the project, describing stitches.

### **MAKER ARTS**

An item or display that showcases a blend of art with science, technology, engineering and/or math (STEM). Please include a display card that explains how your item or display utilizes the elements of STEM.

## OUTDOOR EDUCATION & RECREATION

Article or display pertaining to any project where the member has learned or practiced an outdoor skill or outdoor recreational activity. Examples include a display of knots & their purpose, a camping trip diary, how to use a map or compass, describe hikes taken, show off your outdoor summer vacation, create a new playground design, and more.

## PHOTOGRAPHY

Photos of high quality, illustrating techniques of photography (rule of thirds, good lighting, special effects, etc.). Photos are to be mounted by the member in one unit (ex. poster or scrapbook or framed display). Suggested resolution for digital images is at least 1000 x 1250 pixels. They must be displayed appropriately for the item (ex. mounted in a mat, frame, stretched canvas or board). Photos must include a brief description or caption about the piece in 2-4 sentences. Classes: Color Class; Black and White Class; Computer Generated Class (works must be originals and no copy-right images allowed); No more than one entry per class

## POULTRY

Same as large animals or 1 dozen eggs (produced by member's hens).

## READING

One book report with cover designed by member OR an article pertaining to the project.

## REUSE, REPURPOSE, RECYCLE

An object created using mainly items that have had a previous purpose (e.g. a shelf made from old barn boards, a handbag from a feed bag)

A restored object, such as a small piece of furniture that has been repaired and/or refinished.

## SCIENCE

Article or display pertaining to project. Examples might include a rocket, robot, planes, or other mechanical project. Specify if made from a kit.

## SHOOTING SPORTS

No firearms allowed in Exhibit Hall. Article or display pertaining to project. Example: photos, notebook, video, poster, diorama, collage, etc. of various parts of gun or bow and arrow, shooting positions, safety, competition, survival kit, injuries and treatment, model range, etc.

## TECHNOLOGY

A display/presentation that creatively represents your project such as a poster display, pictures, slideshow, video etc. Maximum 10-minute multimedia presentation. If specific software is required, you must make prior arrangements with hall coordinators, potentially including providing computer and software for judging. Members must include a visual display component that can remain in the hall for the entire week.

## VEGETABLE GARDENING

Grown by member appropriately displayed, include a description listing specific varieties.

Level I: One kind of vegetable chosen from the list below in the quantity stated.

Level II: Two kinds of vegetables from the list below in the quantity stated.

Level III: Three kinds of vegetables from the list below in the quantity stated.

The following units are accepted: 10 pod beans, snap (green or waxed); 10 pods beans, shell; 10 pods beans, lima; 5 beets; 1 head of broccoli; 5 Brussels sprouts; 1 head cabbage; 5 carrots; 1 head cauliflower, 5 cucumbers; 3 gourds; 1 muskmelon; 5 onions; 10 pods peas; 5 parsnips; 3 peppers; 5 potatoes; 1 pumpkin; 5 radishes; 5 rutabagas; 3 squash, summer variety; 1 squash, winter variety; 5 ears sweet corn; 3 tomatoes, 6 cherry tomatoes; 3 turnips; 1 watermelon.

## VETERINARY SCIENCE

Notebook, display, or an article pertaining to the project. OR display a way (lesson, poster, visual) to teach the public about biosecurity or a vet science topic.

## WOODWORKING & METALWORKING

Article pertaining to the project. Examples include A project built from wood, a carved project, a wood-burning project, a detailed woodworking or metal working plan or an object made primarily from metal using a process such as metal machining, welding, forging, etc.

## WOOL PROJECT

Project pertaining to wool.

## WOOL FLEECE

One fleece per breed from ewe owned by member sheared in the current year. The exhibit should include the age of sheep from which removed, weight of fleece and breed of sheep.

## WOOL PELTS

One pelt per breed.

## 4-H CLUB EXHIBITS

Club exhibits should illustrate some phase of 4-H Club work. The main idea behind a Club Exhibit is to provide the club the opportunity to display as a total group. To enter a club exhibit please complete the online entry form provided by the Extension Office. This will ensure that appropriate area is made available. No notebooks allowed. Clubs must provide their own table not to exceed 4'x4'. An exhibit card supplied by the Extension Office must accompany your exhibit. 4-H Club Exhibit judging criteria as follows:

1. Exhibit theme-does exhibit express one idea; and help explain 4-H to the Public? Is it educational? 30 points
2. Quality of articles and/or workmanship 20 points
3. Expresses creativity 20 points
4. Exhibit attracts and holds the viewers attention 15 points
5. General appearance and neatness (article size, arrangements of objects) 15 points

## 4-H LIVESTOCK EXHIBIT RULES

4-H Livestock members must be a member of the Maine 4-H. Livestock members must be a member of the Maine Association of Livestock Exhibitors except Poultry and Rabbits or have a valid farm insurance certificate listing "Cumberland Farmers Club" on certificate of Insurance.

All exhibitors are required to complete and submit a W9 form. No checks issued without completed W9. Form in back of book or available on request.

## ELIGIBILITY

Open to all 4-H members in Cumberland County, without discrimination. 4-H Project Records must be up to date. Only Cumberland County and 4-H club members who have attended 80% of their club meetings and attend June Jamboree, unless excused by their leader, are eligible to show in 4-H livestock classes at Cumberland Fair. EXCEPTIONS: 4-H Market Lambs open to members of the Cumberland County 4-H Sheep Club and 4-H members raising Scramble Steers from the Cumberland Farmer's Club must attend the Red- and White-Faced Baby Beef Club meetings. 4-H Market Hogs is open only to members of the Cumberland County 4-H Swiners Club.

## RESPONSIBILITY

Since education is the goal of the 4-H animal programs, adults should not prepare 4-H member's animals for showing. 4-H livestock projects are the sole responsibility of the 4-H member. Animals, stalling areas, and equipment shall be kept clean and neat at all times.

## REGISTRATION

All animals eligible to be shown must be registered with the Cooperative Extension Office on the 4-H Animal Approval form listing proper identification and own/lease by the appropriate dates for type of animal. Approval forms must be signed by Extension Educator & 4-H Leader.

## JUDGING

All 4-H livestock will be judged by Danish System unless otherwise stated. Participants receiving premiums in a large 4-H livestock project, (Beef, Dairy, Horse, Sheep, Goat and Swine) must have reached their 9th birthday, but not have passed their 19th birthday as of midnight, January 1st of the current year.

## HEALTH

All animals exhibited must meet the health requirements of the State of Maine, Department of Agriculture and the Cumberland Farmer's Club listed under the Livestock Department Section. Horse show exhibitors, proof of negative Coggins is required. Swine or Market Hog must show proof of Brucellosis and Pseudo-rabies test, copy of health papers must be submitted with 4-H entry form.

## SHOWING

For the safety of the 4-H exhibitor, any animal that cannot be managed by its owner, may be excused at the judge's discretion.

## ANIMALS

Any breed, grade or purebred. All Boars, Rams, Bulls, and Stallions Any breed, grade, or purebred. All Boars, Bucks, Rams, Bulls, and Stallions must be registered.

## SHOW ATTIRE

Recommended show attire for 4-H exhibitors is white shirts and white, black, tan, or green pants. For protection of feet, appropriate footwear should be worn. No farm or breed advertisement are allowed in the 4-H show ring. EXCEPTION: Horse - proper show attire for riding seat, HARD HATS required.

## PROJECTS

Project records should be completed by the end of Fair week or when required by 4-H Leaders.

### CUMBERLAND FAIR SCRAMBLE CALF RULES

THIS IS NOT A 4-H SANCTIONED EVENT

THE CUMBERLAND FARMER'S CLUB WILL NOT ACCEPT SCRAMBLE CALVES WEIGHING OVER 450 LBS. (PREFERABLY 350 LBS.)

TIME: 9:30 AM Saturday, following the pig scramble

## ELIGIBILITY

1. Any Cumberland County 4-H member between the ages of 12-18 as of January 1 of the current year. Young people planning to leave the area for post high school education are encouraged not to enter the scramble. Scramble Entries are due September 1.
2. 4-H member must have been enrolled in a large animal project and successfully completed the project prior to entering the scramble. Scramble participants must actively join and participate in 4-H Cumberland County Baby Beef Club (Red & White Faces)
4. Must have adequate facilities, stable, box stall, well fenced exercise area, and adequate food and bedding.
5. A 4-H beef club member drawing a sorry for two consecutive years will be automatically eligible for a calf the third year provided member stays in the beef project raising a steer during those two years and has never caught a scramble steer before.
7. Final selection is made by the Cumberland Farmer's Club.
8. If any member gives up a steer for any reason, the steer will automatically go to the alternate. Cumberland Farmers Club to approve any change of ownership.
9. Each member participating in the scramble must have 2 rope halters and at least one parent or guardian present at the scramble. Suitable transportation for the steer must be present to remove animal immediately after scramble weighing is complete.
10. All contestants must furnish their own equipment to properly take care of their animals
11. Contestants must have the financial ability to feed and care for the project. Expenses may be well over \$2,000.00.

## SALE

#### GENERAL RULES

Due to lack of space each Dairy exhibitor (farm or family) may be limited to 10 animals.

Due to lack of space each Beef exhibitor (farm or family) may be limited to 10 animals per exhibitor.

All stalls must be cleaned out with all manure wheeled to manure pit by 9 AM each day. Each exhibitor must furnish their own wheelbarrow.

No interference with any Judges, State Veterinarian or State Official will be allowed while they are discharging their duties. Any abusive language by the exhibitor or their attendants shall make these exhibitors liable to be suspended from the privileges of this Fair, by the Livestock Superintendent or his Assistants, and forfeit all prize money.

Ages of all animals to date from September (Unless otherwise stated). No distinction made between polled and horned cattle.

EXHIBITORS OF PRIZE WINNERS must show animals in any designated area requested.

All 4-H livestock entered and shown in the open classes will come under the same rules and regulations as other livestock entered and shown in open classes.

THE MANAGEMENT reserves the right to accept or reject any entry made the premium list has the approval of the board of directors, further changes or awards will not be made without their consent. The management further reserves the right to interpret any rule or statement made in this book. If for any unavoidable reason the society cannot meet its obligations the exhibitor must accept a discount in their prizes pro-rated with any such losses. In making your entry you accept this as part of your contract.

#### GENERAL

All animals to compete for herd or group premiums must first be entered for single premiums.

An animal may enter as many groups as it is eligible, according to class and age. The Association is not responsible for any loss by fire or theft, although a night watchman may be provided. All Boars, Bulls, and Rams must be registered. Limit 2 entries per class per farm or family. Beef cattle must be purebreds.

#### FEED

Hay and straw must be furnished by exhibitor and may be for sale on the grounds at reasonable rates. Grain may be for sale by local dealers and delivered to the grounds daily. Stalls and pens are supplied with bedding.

#### INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

Must be member of Maine association of Livestock Exhibitors. A CERTIFICATE OF INSURANCE giving satisfactory evidence of the amount of coverage must be submitted to and approved by the Superintendent prior to the arrival of stock or exhibits on the fairgrounds. Further, such certificate shall warrant that the policies may not be cancelled or changes without 10 days prior written notice to the Cumberland Farmer's Club.

#### UNSUITABLE ANIMALS

The Cumberland Farmer's Club reserves the right to eliminate any animal from competition or premium eligibility that are not in suitable condition. Superintendent may require unsuitable animals to be removed from the Fairgrounds at their discretion.

JUDGING All decisions of Judges are final, except on appeal. Exhibitors will inquire at the Livestock Office for order of judging.

RIGHT OF APPEAL If for any reason an exhibitor wishes to make an appeal of the decision from the judge, they must present the same to the Livestock Superintendent in writing within five hours of the cause of the appeal with a fee of \$25, when such action will be taken by the management as deemed best. If it is found they had good

causes said \$25 will be refunded to the exhibitor, otherwise to remain in the hands of the Cumberland Farmer's Club.

## OWNERSHIP

All animals must have been acquired prior to August 1 and must be actual property of exhibitor. An attempt to defraud or misrepresent will result in withholding all premiums due the exhibitor and barring him from further exceptions. Members of the same farm-family may be regarded as one exhibitor.

## JOINT OWNERSHIP OF BREEDING CATTLE

An animal owned in partnership, which partnership has been in existence 30 days prior to the date of closing entries, may be shown in the name of the part-owner, but the facts of the partnership must be stated at time of the entry, and the animals must appear in the same part owner's name through all classes wherein named.

The Cumberland Country RBA, being a club within ARBA, will be governed by and run under the latest revised official show rules of ARBA and all prizes will be awarded strictly in accordance with the American Standard of Perfection.

CCRBA reserves the right to substitute judges in place of those listed or appoint additional judges if necessary. Show entry denotes acceptance of assigned judge(s). The Show Superintendent and/or Show Secretary have the right to make necessary changes, including, but not limited to, changes in judges, judging order and the breeds that the judges will examine. Judging assignments are made prior to the show. Do not ask for a breed to be reassigned to a different judge the day of the show.

— The Cumberland County RBA reserves the right to restrict show entries due to RHDV2 limitations. No entries will be taken from anywhere within the 150 miles from an RHDV2 outbreak.

\* To reduce ammonia in the showroom, Kiln dried pine shavings are affordable and proven to work. Same with pine stall pellets. There have been no cases of RHDv2 transmission due to shavings or hay as a vector.

\* If you use hay (for feeding/a boredom buster), we recommend using hay that is not from a location where RHDv2 has been active for the last 4 months OR the bale has been stored away from wildlife for at least 4 months before use.

\* A good alternative is compressed hay cubes.

1. The Judge's decision shall be final, except in the case of fraud. Protests, if any, shall be made in accordance with ARBA rules.
2. Grooming tables, chairs, blowers, supplies, etc are permitted based on space. Please do not block pathways and please stack your cages when possible.
3. Only Rabbits and/or Cavy will be permitted in the Showroom— no other pets or livestock. Animals who are rendering a service for their owners are permitted, by law, but if the animal shows too much interest in the caged rabbits (and you're not correcting the animal as the handler) or barks repeatedly without reason (medical alert is reasonable)— you may be asked to keep your animal under control or leave.
4. All Rabbits must be permanently and legibly tattooed in the left ear in order to be shown.
5. All Cavy must be ear tagged for identification in order to be shown.
6. Animals are entered at the owner's risk. Show personnel and judges are not in any way responsible for death, injury or loss of any animal. But all possible care will be taken to safeguard the animal's health and safety.
7. Any animal showing signs of disease will be immediately removed from the showroom, whether they are on the show table or not and the entry fee will be forfeited,

if applicable. Please be considerate of your fellow exhibitors and leave sick animals at home.

8. Maine State Law requires all rabbits to be at least 8 weeks of age in order to be sold. The Show Superintendent and Show Secretary have the right to ask for verification of age and/or oversee the potential removal of any underaged animals.

9. No animals permitted at the show under 8 weeks (2 months) of age, does with kits should be left at home if they're not weaned fully.

10. No breeding permitted in the Showroom; this is a health/biosecurity issue.

11. No alcohol, firearms or smoking are allowed on the premises.

12. Exhibitors attempting to/actually interfering with, annoying, molesting, influencing/bribing a judge, or acting in an unbecoming manner will be ejected and barred from the show and potential future shows. All entry fees will be forfeited.

13. Anyone found to be engaging in any harassment, threatening/malicious behavior, or any discriminatory actions/language towards any person at the show will forfeit their entry fees and will be required to leave the show.

14. All Entries must be paid before judging begins at 9:00am, to the Show Secretary or Secretary Personnel.

15. Any day of show changes other than ear number changes will be considered a day of show entry and are subject to an additional charge of \$3 extra per animal, per show.  
16. Returned check fee is \$50 plus the amount of the check. Day of show scratches are still charged entry fee.

17. Exhibitors MUST pick up check-in sheets and verify your entry – check for typos or missing information.

18. All rabbits entered in fur or wool classes must also be entered in the regular breed classes.

19. All entered exhibitors and their rabbits must be in the Showroom by 8:30am. All breed judging starts promptly at 9:00am.

20. To avoid Judging Table delays, a three call rule (next breed will be called to come up to the table) will apply at the Judge's discretion. Animals not at the judge's table when called up can be eliminated from judging at the Show Superintendent's discretion.

### RULES

- All PARADE Participants are required to register and complete a liability waiver prior to the parade. Pre-registration by mail or email is encouraged. LATE ARRIVALS on the day of the parade may not be allowed to participate. All participants are asked to provide names, addresses and information about their entry, organization, cause, etc. You may also provide a small write-up that may be read by the announcer.
- ALL PARADE Participants are to check in at the registration table no later than 10:30 AM. You will receive your LINE-UP # assignment and instructions. All participants should be respectful of one another and be cautious when on the racetrack to ensure everyone's safety. During the parade, as you approach the grandstand area, you should pause briefly while the announcer speaks about your float, vehicle, organization, animal, etc. Then proceed and

exit the track. Parade participation does NOT automatically entitle you to free admission to the Cumberland Fair.

- FLOATS - will enter from the BRUCE HILL ROAD entrance and stage in the field that has been designated. All Floats must be ready for judging at 10:00 AM. All Float Entries should display their name/organization name. Float Entries will be judged on connection to/use of theme, originality, workmanship. When there is but one entry in a class, it will be considered by the judges but is not guaranteed an award. Provide a list of names of people on float. Provide brief description for announcer.
- ANIMALS - Proof of negative Coggins is required of all horses & ponies. NO ANIMAL IS TO PARADE IN FRONT OF THE GRAND MARSHALL. Provide names, town/farm name/club and interesting data about you and animal for announcer. Livestock may enter the track at a different gate than other participants.
- VEHICLES - Any motorized vehicle in the parade is asked to be aware and respectful of the conditions on the track. No burnouts, wheelies or other stunts that would cause damage to the racetrack are allowed. Maintain a safe distance from other participants and hang toward the outside edge of the track closest to the fence. Be mindful of livestock - no loud noises that would startle the animals. Enter the track according to LINE-UP # assignments and instructions. Exit racetrack and beware of livestock, pedestrians, and other vehicular traffic in immediate area. Provide Year, Make, Model, Color, Owner/Driver of Vehicle for Announcer.
